For the first time ever, the General Service Conference will be held virtually, during this pandemic for which Area 49, SENY is the epicenter. We have lost many AA members and many family members. We are grieving.

Our 36 principles will guide us through this time; we’ll practice love and tolerance as our code, we will learn much. We will be comforted that our Book, our 12&12, “AA Comes of Age” and our latest book, “Our Great Responsibility” are full of blunders we’ve made along the way and learned from. We may apply these lessons learned, embodied in our 12 Traditions, to questions members are starting to ask about safely reopening face to face meetings. The General Service Office, our Area, your district and county service structure cannot tell an AA group what to do; we offer resources to help your group come to an informed conscience.

[Safety in AA our Common Welfare](#) reminds us to talk about issues of safety before they arise., that safety is something each member attending an AA meeting can be mindful of, and that common sense and experience suggest that A.A. membership does not grant immunity from local regulations and being at an A.A. meeting does not put anyone beyond the jurisdiction of government mandates. Or, as my first service sponsor used to pound into my head, “Jane! The law of the land does not end at the door of the meeting!”

We have a chance to explore new possibilities in applying all our Traditions. We know of members who do not have a smart phone or internet access, thus limiting their access to virtual meetings. We also know of members who now get to more meetings than ever before. I was on a meeting where a member is now going to two or three meetings a day but for 18 years made one or two meetings a week, due to physical limitations. [AA Online Intergroup](#) was started in the 1990s largely to help members with such accessibility concerns.

Each AA group needs to come to its own informed conscience, service entities below the groups provide information so the group can make its own informed conscience to act on. This is just the beginning of a larger conversation. Truly, we are in the “Flying Blind Period 2.0”!

## An Aspect of Service – Vision

Hello, friends. Last month in this column I talked about “flexibility”, and the subject this month will be “vision”. Those of you familiar with Concept IX will remember that those are two of the four attributes needed “among our leaders of A.A. services at all levels”. Interestingly, flexibility is more or less an “in the moment” quality, whereas vision applies to the future. And that’s what I’d like all of us to ponder right now: the future, in particular the immediate future.

On May 9th Area 68 (Southwestern Texas) presented a virtual workshop entitled “Are we ready to re-open?” It was the same day and time as our Joy of Service Workshop, so our Delegate Jane covered Texas while I covered Putnam County. Just four days later our own District 618 presented another virtual workshop, “Reopening meeting spaces for AA meetings safely”, with Jane as the speaker and me as one of the 300 attendees (from all over the U.S., and Canada as well).

Having personally attended the latter, and having read all the survey comments from the former, I can tell you two things: 1) for the most part, the population density (and therefore the perspective, and the number of deaths) is wildly different between the two Areas; and 2) the core questions are the same. How do we continue to reach out to the newcomer? How do we keep our safety at the forefront, and at the same time not turn anyone away? How do we honor all aspects of Tradition Four? And how can we keep the essence of this Program of Recovery intact, while adapting it to face a new, all-pervasive reality?

I certainly don’t know the answers (I suspect there is more than one). But I heard and read glimmers of those answers at D618 and SW Texas. We all have to be leaders, and we all have to seek vision; to take another line from Concept IX a bit out of context, “The stakes are about as big as they could be”. I love A.A., and I want to keep carrying the message. But I can’t carry the message if I’m dead.

We’re all leaders in Alcoholics Anonymous. And it’s time to look to a new future.

### June Historical Dates

**June 10th,1939** - Dr. Bob’s last drink and the official founding date of AA.

**June 11th,1945** - Twenty five hundred members attend AA’s Tenth Anniversary in Cleveland, Ohio.

**June 16th,1938** - Jim Burwell “The Vicious Cycle” in the Big Book had his last drink.

**June 18th,1940** - One hundred AA’s attend the first meeting in the first clubhouse at 334-1/2 West 24th Street, New York City.

**June 21st,1944** - The first issue of the AA Grapevine was published.

**June 26th,1935** - Bill Dotson, (AA#3), entered Akron’s City Hospital for his last detox and his first day of sobriety.

**June 28th,1935** - Dr. Bob and Bill Wilson visited Bill Dotson at Akron’s City Hospital.

**June 30th,1941** - Ruth Hock showed Bill Wilson the “Serenity Prayer” and it was adopted readily by AA.
